Secrets vs Surprises

It's important to teach children that keeping secrets is not allowed. Whether the secret seems exciting or fun, or makes a child feel sad, scared, or uncomfortable—especially if it breaks a body safety rule—children should always share it with a trusted adult.



Keeping a Secret means not telling anyone, <u>ever</u>. This is not allowed, even if it's something fun.

Keeping a surprise means staying quiet until the right time and then <u>everyone</u> knows.





Help your child identify which is a secret and which is a surprise.



 Your neighbor gave you a piece of candy and told you not to tell your parents.



 Your family is throwing a surprise party for your grandparents and you're not supposed to tell them.



 You're going on a trip but your parents don't want you to tell your sibling until morning.



 A cousin showed you a scary movie and said you'd be in trouble and not to tell.



• A friend wanted to show you their private parts in the bathroom.
